Pastor's Message

It is certainly summer! The confirmation youth went to camp last week, Vacation Bible School is this week and in a couple of weeks the senior high youth will be going to Anapra, Mexico for their mission trip. Rainbow Trail Lutheran Camp is leading all three of these week long camps. The theme this year is *Forgiven: A Better Version of Me*. The kids and youth will look deeper into themselves, their sinful selves and their brokenness. The good news of all of this is that God forgives us and loves us even in our brokenness.

This was a very powerful theme for our confirmation students last week. One thing I enjoyed about the Bible studies was that they didn't hammer the youth down and then build them up. The first day, the youth learned about God's crazy, unconditional love. God has an incredible love for us and an amazing gift of forgiveness, given to us in Christ Jesus. Another part of this day was hearing how nothing can separate us from the love of God. We can't do anything to make God love us more and we can't do anything to make God love us less.



We then got into our brokenness. God sees us clearly, which means we can't hide our brokenness, our sin, our desires from God. However, God looks past our brokenness. God forgives us and loves us as broken, sinful people. This forgiveness is radical and insane and it's God's forgiveness for us. This forgiveness is given to us through the amazing sacrifice of Jesus' death on the cross.

Through God's forgiveness of us, we are inspired to ask for forgiveness and to forgive others. This isn't always natural for us, but God compels us to live a different way of life than what is natural. As we go out and practice this forgiveness, we don't go alone. God walks with us and we are surrounded by the love and support of our fellow believers as we bring this love and forgiveness out into the world around us. Forgiveness is hard to ask for and forgiveness is hard to give. In order to ask for forgiveness, we have to admit to ourselves that we have done something wrong, we have sinned and/or that we are broken. It is hard to admit these things to ourselves; it's especially hard for teenagers.

Worship Notes - July 6, 2014

INTRODUCTION: *The mystery of God's ways is sometimes hidden from the wise and intelligent. Jesus associates with the lowly and outcast. Like Paul, we struggle with our own selfish desires and seek God's mercy and forgiveness. We gather to be refreshed by Christ's invitation: "Come to me, all you that are weary." Gathered around word, water, and meal, we find rest for our souls.*

FIRST READING: Zechariah 9:9–12 *The coming messianic king will inaugurate an era of disarmament and prosperity. Because of God's covenant with Israel, they are designated as "prisoners of hope."*

SECOND READING: Romans 7:15–25a *Life enslaved under sin is a catch-22 existence in which we know good but do not do it and do things we know to be bad. Through Jesus Christ, God has set us free from such a futile existence*

GOSPEL: Matthew 11:16–19, 25–30 *Jesus chides people who find fault with both his ministry and that of John the Baptist. He thanks God that wisdom and intelligence are not needed to receive what God has to offer.* ☩

Lighting FUNdraising Update

The FUNdraising numbers are in and they look very good. Among the golf outing, golf hole/golf cart sponsors, the silent auction, and the wall of wine we made \$12,000 — all of which will go toward the sanctuary lighting. Thank you to the team of Kristen Celusniak, Jerry Mydlach, Jan Philpy, and Erin White. You did an incredible job and spent so many hours on this FUNdraiser. I am extremely grateful for each one of you and the talents you brought to the table. Thank you, too, to everyone who participated in the golf outing and in the bidding wars. I hope you had a lot of fun and we appreciate your support.

The total cost for our new lights is \$37,400. We will get some money back in the form of Xcel rebates, but we don't yet know the number. That dollar amounts sounds very expensive, but in reality it isn't so bad. The money will replace 14 of the silver pendant lights that fuse together about every two to three weeks as well as the 8 fixtures over the baptismal area in the dropped ceiling. These 22 lights are LED fixtures with LED bulbs and will not need to be replaced for 17-22 years! It also includes \$4,500 for installation of the new lights. These new fixtures are compatible with the current dimming system and the current control modules. No additional wiring will need to be done. We will save money on our utilities as well as not replacing light bulbs all the time. We will be more green. Additionally, Scott Miller will get to have some time on the weekends for his family instead of repairing and replacing the light fixtures here. He has spent countless hours on this, but the last four to five years have been very time consuming. Thank you, Scott, for your ministry.

We anticipate the lights will be installed by the time Pr. Nathan returns from his sabbatical—around mid August. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact any member of our church council or Linda in the church office. Again, thank you all very much for your support and participation. ☞

St. Philip Communications Going “Green”

At the synod assembly in May, a resolution was passed to develop a synod-wide “greening program” to recommend that all congregations work to “go green” in an effort to become better stewards of creation. Our church council has agreed that there are more steps we can take as a congregation to go green. We have already done a few things to make us more energy conscious and efficient:

- We have replaced old T-12 light bulbs with more energy efficient T-8 bulbs.
- We have installed HVAC controls which prevent the heating and air conditioning from running during times when they aren't needed.
- We plan to replace 14 canned lights and 8 recessed lights in the sanctuary with LED lights that will burn longer and brighter at a much reduced cost.

The biggest change we will make, however, is the way we will communicate with each of you. We will be switching over to more electronic communications, which will not only be more green, but will reach many more of our parishioners. The three main changes in communications will be:

1. The Happenings will no longer be a printed weekly newsletter. Instead, as you enter worship you will receive a one-page worship bulletin which outlines the service.
2. An email blast will be sent out each Wednesday to the congregation containing ministry information and insights into the upcoming worship theme.
3. The Happenings newsletter will convert to an monthly e-newsletter and will be posted on our website. You will receive a message with a link to the website when the monthly newsletter is posted.

We will still have a limited number of newsletters available for those who do not have access to internet or email. In addition, all homebound members will continue to receive a printed copy. Please contact Linda Goodnough in the church office with any questions or concerns. ☞

The food bank, located in the Sheridan Rec. Center, opened June 5th, and will be open for distribution every Thursday evening from 4:30pm-7pm. The following needs are critical to our continued success:

Food and Other Donations Needed:

- 1-2lb. bags of dried beans
- Canned black beans & corn
- Tomato sauce
- Canned meats
- 1-2lb. bags of sugar
- 1-2lb. bags of rice
- Canned fruit
- Massa
- Packaged tortillas
- Cooking oil
- Personal care items*
- Diapers (smaller sizes) & wipes

Please note: large containers or bags of food are not helpful because we do not have authorization from the health department to open and divide food items.

***Helpful Tip:** When you travel, please save the small personal size hygiene items from hotels and donate them!

We still desperately need volunteers to:

- Pick up food at the Food Bank of the Rockies once a week. You must have a van, SUV, pickup truck or trailer.
- Meet and help unload the FBR pickup vehicle. Days and times will vary.

Then we have to go a step farther and ask for forgiveness from the person we have hurt. It's also hard to forgive someone else because they have really hurt you. It may or may not have been intentional, but it still can be hard to forgive them. A person may be wondering if they are truly even sorry for what they have done, but it isn't our job to judge. We truly do struggle with sin and brokenness every day of our lives and forgiveness has to be part of our lives as we are in relationship with each other.

This topic of forgiveness will be our topic for Vacation Bible School this week, the Mission Trip at the end of July, as well as for the sermon the next couple of weeks as we read Romans. As you struggle with your sin and brokenness, may you remember God's love and forgiveness in your life!
