Scripture Readings for April 23-24, 2016

FIRST READING: Acts 11:1-18

In defense of his earlier baptism of pagan believers, Peter demonstrates to the members of the Jerusalem church that God's intention to love Gentiles as well as Jews is revealed in Jesus' own testimony. In this way the mission to the Gentiles is officially authorized.

¹Now the apostles and the believers who were in Judea heard that the Gentiles had also accepted the word of God. ²So when Peter went up to Jerusalem, the circumcised believers criticized him, ³saying, "Why did you go to uncircumcised men and eat with them?" ⁴Then Peter began to explain it to them, step by step, saying, ⁵I was in the city of Joppa praying, and in a trance I saw a vision. There was something like a large sheet coming down from heaven, being lowered by its four corners; and it came close to me. ⁶As I looked at it closely I saw four-footed animals, beasts of prey, reptiles, and birds of the air. ⁷I also heard a voice saving to me, 'Get up, Peter; kill and eat.' ⁸But I replied, 'By no means, Lord; for nothing profane or unclean has ever entered my mouth.' 9But a second time the voice answered from heaven, 'What God has made clean, you must not call profane.' ¹⁰This happened three times; then everything was pulled up again to heaven. ¹¹At that very moment three men, sent to me from Caesarea, arrived at the house where we were. ¹²The Spirit told me to go with them and not to make a distinction between them and us. These six brothers also accompanied me, and we entered the man's house. ¹³He told us how he had seen the angel standing in his house and saying, 'Send to Joppa and bring Simon, who is called Peter; ¹⁴he will give you a message by which you and your entire household will be saved.' ¹⁵And as I began to speak, the Holy Spirit fell upon them just as it had upon us at the beginning. ¹⁶And I remembered the word of the Lord, how he had said, 'John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit.' ¹⁷If then God gave them the same gift that he gave us when we believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could hinder God?" 18When they heard this, they were silenced. And they praised God, saying, "Then God has given even to the Gentiles the repentance that leads to life."

SECOND READING: Revelation 21:1-6

John's vision shows us that in the resurrection the new age has dawned; God dwells with us already. Yet we wait for the time when the tears that cloud our vision will be wiped away. Then we will see the new heaven, new earth, and new Jerusalem.

¹Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth; for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and the sea was no more. ²And I saw the holy city, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. ³And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "See, the home of God is among mortals. He will dwell with them; they will be his peoples, and God himself will be with them; ⁴he will wipe every tear from their eyes. Death will be no more; mourning and crying and pain will be no more, for the first things have passed away." ⁵And the one who was seated on the throne said, "See, I am making all things new." Also he said, "Write this, for these words are trustworthy and true." ⁶Then he said to me, "It is done! I am the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end. To the thirsty I

will give water as a gift from the spring of the water of life.

GOSPEL: John 13:31-35

After washing the disciples' feet, predicting his betrayal, and then revealing his betrayer, Jesus speaks of his glorification on the cross. This deep complicated love of Jesus, even to death on the cross, will be the distinctive mark of Jesus' community.

³¹When he had gone out, Jesus said, "Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. ³²If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. ³³Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' ³⁴I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. ³⁵By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

Love INC and Partner Churches Help Fire Victims

THANK YOU to Littleton Churches and Citizens for the great support of our neighbors at Southview Place Apartments who were displaced by fire on April 6. Littleton United Methodist Church provided great hospitality and space for the Red Cross Shelter for the first week. On April 13, the fourteen residents remaining in the shelter are being moved to Littleton Life Center, a ministry of Mission Hills Church. The Littleton Life Center will serve as the ongoing resource center for all the 150 or so residents still out of their homes.

Love INC church volunteers have stepped up in a big way to be a presence at the site, helping to identify and fill immediate gaps in service, which have included shopping for a second or third set of clothes, arranging rides, and doing laundry. THANK YOU not only for the response and willingness to help that Love INC received, but also for the patience of volunteers who, at times arrive and see that nothing is needed after all. It has been inspirational to see how many are willing to help.

Love INC will be at the table among many government and nonprofit agencies who are working on immediate and long term plans for evacuees and returning residents. Our on-going efforts will include helping to locate furnishings for residents and assisting in the moving process, as well as emotional support through Stephen Ministers at local churches and Love INC mentors.

What is immediately needed:

PRAYER: Please pray for a more comfortable housing solution for the fourteen resident still in need of a Red Cross shelter. Though many generous individuals have stepped forward to offer to open their homes, this is not a viable solution. Low or no-cost rooms in a hotel or assisted living facility are ideal. STORAGE SPACE: If you have a garage or storage space available for collecting and storing furniture and household goods please email info@loveinclittleton.org

START A LIST: If you have items of furniture that you may want to donate to evacuees, please keep a list and watch for more details once we are able to mobilize that effort, which may be a couple of weeks.

FINANCIAL CONTRIBUTIONS: There is a big need for funds to support the housing needs of these individuals. Many entities are working together on this, from three levels
